
Cross Lanes United Methodist Church Order of Worship Fifth Sunday of Lent

Some thoughts to take with you this week (from The Third Day):

Saul was not a follower of Jesus. He was a Pharisee who opposed and persecuted Jesus' disciples. His encounter with Jesus on the road to Damascus changed his life and his name. Paul became the key interpreter of the Resurrection to the early church whose insights transformed the Church.

Paul invites us to realize that God is for us. God has a remarkable redemptive capacity and can bring good out of bad situations when we turn to the Lord and become servants of God's will.

Paul's perspective also serves as a reminder that the trials and tribulations of this life are temporary and relatively minor compared to the promise of resurrection yet to come.

As people of the third day, we understand that we are not currently in the land of the living moving toward death. We are currently in the land of the dying moving toward life.

We WILL experience resurrection and new life in eternity. This is the promise of Christ that Paul articulated in his letters to the early church. It is our hope, and it is essential to our identity as Christians.

Prayer: Redeeming God, thank you for loving us as we are and loving us too much to leave us there. We are grateful for the gift of the Holy Spirit and the ongoing work of transformation you are doing in each of us. Help us to cooperate with you as you guide us in the ways you would have each of us serve in this season, working with you to bring hope and healing in this broken world. May we "work for the good of all whenever we have an opportunity;" In Jesus' name. Amen.
